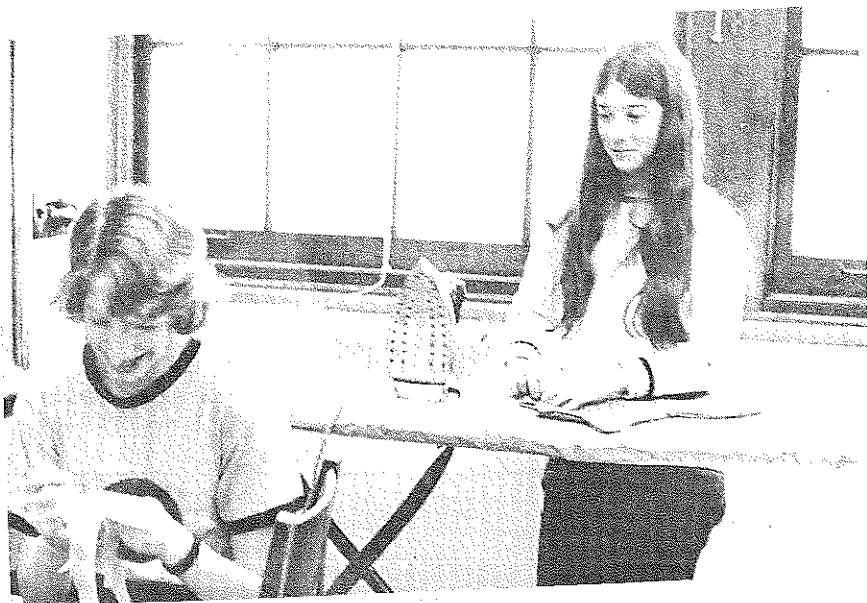
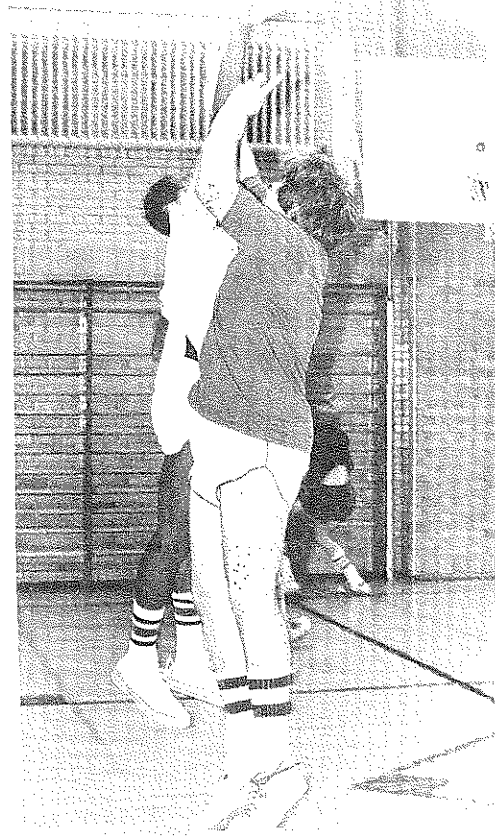
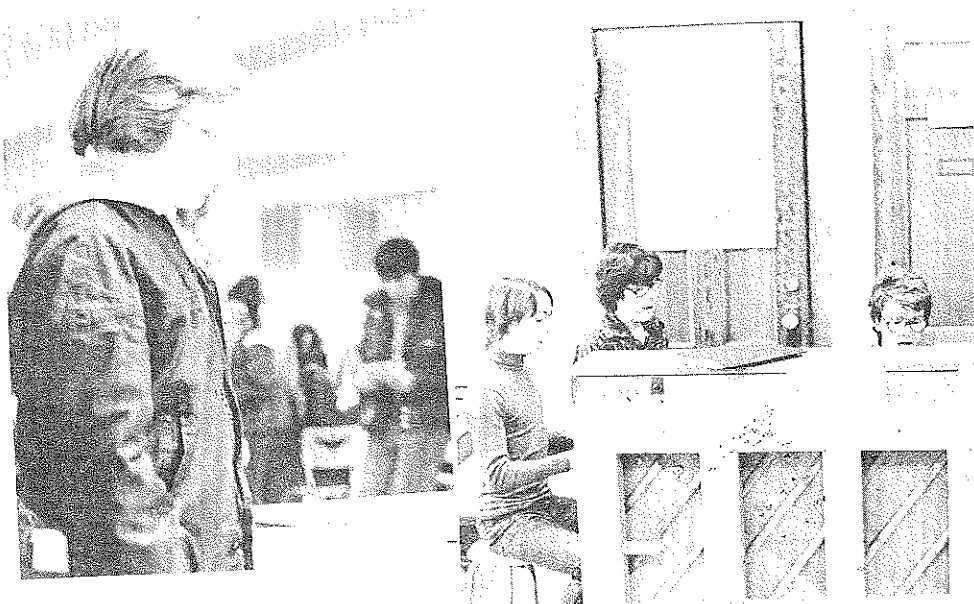
Many men have been seen alive and are known captives of the Viet Cong, yet the Viet Cong still deny any knowledge of them. For example: Staff Sgt. David Demmon was missing-in-action for five and one-half years. In November 1970, he was seen alive and his status was then changed by our government from M.I.A. to P.O.W. (prisoner of war).

As soon as the peace treaty was signed, the North Vietnamese agreed to release the list of all prisoners held by Communist forces in Southeast Asia. But, when the list came out, there were no names of prisoners in Laos. It was only after protest to North Vietnam that an additional list was received from Laos. Out of 317 servicemen who are missing in Laos, only seven names were listed.

America should intensify its efforts, demanding that North Vietnam and her allies live up to the basic laws of humanity and provide complete information on all men they have captured. These men are over there someplace; they do exist!
