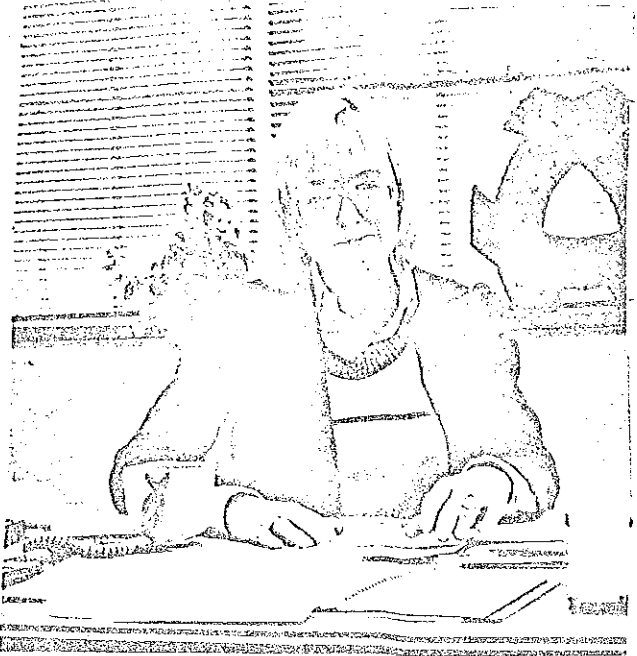

Hockey developed in Canada during the 19th Century. They say it was first played by soldiers of the Royal Canadian Rifles in Kingston, Ontario, who adapted ice hockey from field hockey.. Most of the great hockey players from from the National Hockey League and the United States Olympic hockey teams are in the Hockey Hall of Fame in Eveleth, Minnesota. In the early 1960's there were 63 members in the Hall of Fame but it is growing strong. One of the most famous members is Maurice "Rocket" Richard of the Montreal Canadians. He scored a record total of 626 goals, 544 in regular season play (1942-60) and 82 in Stanley Cup play-off competition before he retired in 1960.

The Minnesota North Stars are presently in 4th place in the National Hockey League with 10 wins, 2 losses, 3 ties, and 23 points, just 5 points behind the league-leading Philadelphia Flyers.

REFLECTION ON HOMEWORK

There were about 25 out of a possible 600 parents present on Nov. 18th for the showing of a colorful film concerned with making visible to parents an image of the reality experienced by today's kids in their use and abuse of drugs. Was the reality of your lack of concern, you Ramsey parents who did not get the picture, reflected accurately your absence? Are you parenting tomorrow's leaders with little or no awareness of what they are learning today?

Parents create the original scenario. This is readily apparent when the stage is set in the classroom with teachers and books. Your child's name is called and IF present that day responds with a vacant stare and "I'm not here." Proof of this role is the next line. "I don't have a pencil."

The casting of this reflection gives star attraction to a lack of motivation, a lack of concern. The acting suffers from a lack of direction. The prop room continues to provide a pencil, only your child has already drawn a conclusion. We are all paying top price for this understudy who has learned how to draw attention, how to draw a crowd, and how to draw a curtain on achievement.

Motivation is a moving picture begun as black and white productions dependent upon the length and light of day. Leaders have at some time to be lead...and that color is gray! A lack of responsibility for even a pencil is an apparent lack, a reflection of the values of your home, and your work.

The development of your child depends upon your exposure to the negative that exists in real life. If you are not motivated to learn about your child, how can you expect your child to be motivated to learn about self, society, and a quality of life equal to or better than the one you are presently experiencing.

Being apparent means visibility. It means being seen today. Today can mean tomorrow when you show you care and make an appearance-- a reflection of a desire to understand-- by your presence rather than absence on Dec. 2.

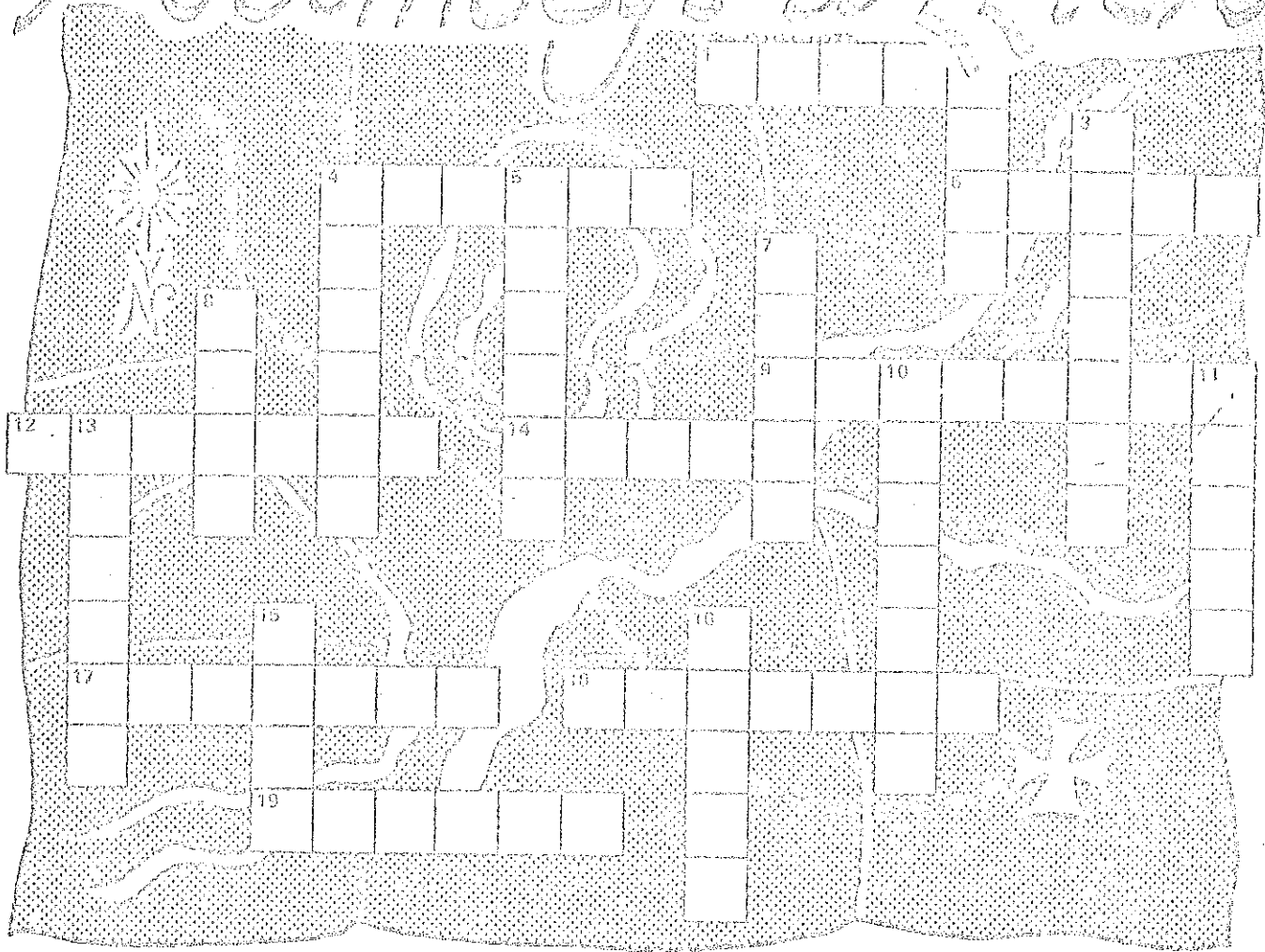
